

MOCK'S MUSINGS

“With your help we believe we can grow our church to God’s glory.”

Friends, last month I invited you to join in our Miracle Sunday drive to pay off our mortgage and God blessed us through your generosity in the amount of \$28,226.00. We know more gifts are coming and feel confident that God will help us reach our goal. Thank you for your faithfulness and dedication to God’s church. The Session continues to work to address the financial issues we are facing, but let me share with you what God is leading us to do to help move us to becoming fiscally sound once again.

This past Sunday (March 23), your elders and deacons gathered to pray, share and discuss plans for this year and beyond. It was a great meeting and you would have been so proud of your servants. We focused on what we consider is our greatest need – more members.

First, we shared what we liked about our church and we decided that those would become talking points about our church that we could share with others. We decided to create a brochure with all these in it so we can give them to visitors and friends. Here are the talking points about what we feel makes First a special place: friendly; Bible preaching; music ministries; good food and fellowship; smaller, family-feel; two different worship services; caring family; Lunch 'n Learns; modern facility; Bible studies; small groups; Stephen Ministry; Bereavement Ministry; Presbyterian Women; R.O.M.E.O.S.; prayer meeting; mission program; and a parish nurse. I’m sure you could think of others and if you do, please contact me because we want to know everything good about God’s church here at First and include them as well. Our hope is that this will make it easier for us to invite others to our church.

Then we talked about how we can reach out into the community to let them know what a wonderful home First is. We decided to improve our Yellow Pages ad and to try advertising with local homeowners’ associations and parks where possible. We plan to try to contact new residents in our and the surrounding zip codes and point them to our website, which we will improve to make it possible for them to either watch, live or taped, one of our worship services streaming over the Internet. We are exploring getting our choir and praise team out into the community to do concerts, exposing them to how good our music ministries are. We also decided that having a Christmas Card in Gilchrist Park, like we had before, was another way to let the community know we’re here. In fact, we already have a team preparing to work on it. And finally, we want to ask each of you to invite others, friends or neighbors or strangers, to visit our church, using the brochure mentioned as a source of what to say. Studies have shown that about 85% of people join a church because a friend or person invited them to come. With your help, we believe we can grow our church to God’s glory.

After talking about reaching out, we discussed how we welcome visitors to our family. We realized that even though we think we do a good job of welcoming visitors, we could do a better job. Some visitors have felt unwelcomed (not many), but if one feels that way, we’ve dropped the ball. So we discussed trying to identify visitors using nametags and having nametags for all members and friends of our church. We liked the latter more than the first because it would still enable us to identify visitors without causing them to stand out. We decided to go back to a plan that was in place when I first arrived in 2003 of seeking out visitors each Sunday.

We're calling it Dr. Bob's Plan since Dr. Bob Kiskaddon came up with it years ago. The plan is to divide the sanctuary into quarters and have a person designated to look for visitors in that section. After the service, that person would greet the visitor(s), welcoming them to the church and inviting them to the fellowship time following the service. This worked well in the past and many of you became members because of someone greeting you like this. We also talked that during the greeting time at each service, all of us can be more intentional in seeking out visitors or someone we don't know to welcome them in Christ's name. It's so easy for us to greet those we know, but it's even more important to greet those we don't, especially if they are visiting. Many of you go out to breakfast or lunch after the services and we thought how nice it would be to invite visitors to join you. So we are encouraging those who do this to think about asking visitors to come with them to share a meal together. We talked about maybe having a fellowship time between services and that is being considered. Finally we talked about a need to have a better, more intentional Welcome Center, manned by members who would greet visitors arriving for worship and have information to share with them. We thought having a portable greeting stand might be a way to do this and we also realized that if we were going to do this, that we would need a Welcoming Team to organize and operate it.

As you can see, it was a very productive and exciting meeting. We ended our time together with the

setting of our main goal for the rest of 2011 – to bring in 15 new families by the end of the year. Note, this is 15 families, not members. We define a family as a single person, married couple, single with children and married with children, so our membership might actually grow by 20 to 30. This is a great goal. This is a challenging goal. We believe by God's grace and your help that we can succeed and reach this goal. The Session has begun working on these ideas and making plans to do this.

We all believe God has blessed us and called us to share His love with others. We all love God's church here at First and want to see it grow and continue to serve others in Christ's name. Our prayer is, and we ask it to be your prayer, that God will help us exceed our goal.

I thank God for the privilege I have to work alongside such leaders. Together we can build God's church here in Punta Gorda to the glory of God and the blessings of all.

SESSION NOTES


HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE MARCH 21ST SESSION

- Opened meeting with prayer and the reading of Psalm 27.
- Approved motion to remove Bruce Hughes from active membership role per a letter of request by him as he has moved to St. Petersburg, Fl.
- After discussion the financial report was approved. Session also approved the finance committee's recommendations for further budget cuts. Copies of the new revised budget will be made available in the near future.
- Discussion was made on the need to have a designated Handicap Seating Area in the sanctuary. This will be explored.
- Reviewed the 2011 plans and goals that were set at the elder/deacon meeting held on March 20, 2011.
- Finance Committee had a representative from Charlotte Community Bank, Eric DeYoung, come and discuss some of our options on the payoff of the mortgage and also to answer any questions we had.
- Approved motion to elect Gail Thornton and Dianne Sizemore as delegates to the May 26th Presbytery Meeting. Phyllis was also elected as an alternate.
- Discussed the need for a Welcome Station on Sunday mornings for both services. Session thought it was a good idea and is looking for someone to organize it.

“Joyful Worship”

The Bible is filled with commands to worship God joyfully. Some examples are:

Ps. 47:1 Clap your hands, all you nations; shout to God with cries of joy.

Ps. 32:11 Rejoice in the Lord and be glad, you righteous; sing, all you who are upright in heart!

Ps. 66:1-2 Shout with joy to God, all the earth! ² Sing the glory of his name; make his praise glorious!

Psalm 150 ¹ Praise the Lord, Praise God in his sanctuary; praise him in his mighty heavens. ² Praise him for his acts of power; praise him for his surpassing greatness. ³ Praise him with the sounding of the trumpet, praise him with the harp and lyre, ⁴ praise him with tambourine and dancing, praise him with the strings and flute, ⁵ praise him with the clash of cymbals, praise him with resounding cymbals. ⁶ Let everything that has breath praise the Lord. Praise the Lord.

A MESSAGE FROM THE BEREAVEMENT TEAM

How do we achieve happiness in an unhappy world that practices so much pessimism, doom and gloom? A gerontologist once told me that happy people seem to live longer because they find good things to focus on in this life. They seem to realize they have so much more to do for the Lord. The joy of the Lord should be the focus of any Christian church. Love, joy, peace and goodness are the mantra by which we strive to live and it works. Happiness is anger-free; is forgetful of the past; realizes it is not perfect; and avoids sin, while being assertive, not aggressive.

Happiness evolves from what we think; feels blessed by being saved and forgiven by Christ's death on the cross; and is water against the oil of sin. It is merciful to others and acts as a peacemaker, while seeking the Kingdom of Heaven.

Happiness is wise and knows that choices have consequences, and if it is lost, it usually is due to a person who has given it up for worry, self centered pursuits and other choices that cause emotional discomfort that, in turn, breeds unhappiness.

A fellow therapist, who was a family therapist, told me years ago that marriage absorbs happiness and does not create it. Happiness is not free and must be cultivated continuously throughout life. Would it not be wonderful if after each of our earthly memorials someone would say of us, "He/she was such a happy person and fun to be with." The implications of that statement would be so wonderful and out-reaching.

Psalm 68:3: But let the righteous be glad; let them rejoice before God; yea, let them exceedingly rejoice.

THE PARISH NURSE HEALTH CORNER

Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear....Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to his life? Matthew 6:25, 27

It is said that whatever is good for your heart is good for your brain! We just finished a Lunch 'n Learn about saving your memory and here is some information:

- **Decrease Stress** — This is huge! Stress and depression changes your brain and sets you up for memory problems. Write your worries in a prayer journal each morning and give them to God, then STOP the negative thoughts until you return to your journal the next day.
- **Exercise** — This keeps oxygen rich nutrients flowing to the brain. We all know walking is good for us, as is any exercise that gets us off the couch. Just bouncing a ball promotes hand-eye coordination and can cut your chances of falling, as does ping pong, Tai Chi or Pilates.
- **Socialization** — It is important to share your thoughts and ideas with others. SHARED PAIN IS ONE-HALF THE PAIN! Getting out, laughing and thinking about others is very healthy!
- **Eat healthy foods** — Fruits, whole-grain cereals and other whole grain products contain high levels of antioxidants. Fruits such as apples, blueberries, nectarines and peaches contain up to 5 times more polyphenols (substances with antioxidant benefits). Avoid processed foods that last indefinitely on the store shelf or freezer, as well as artificial sweeteners and MSG.
- **Try New Brain Puzzles** — Play games that involve memory (card games), crossword puzzles, bingo, play a new instrument, cook a new dish. You can improve your memory by doing familiar things in unfamiliar ways such as brushing your teeth with your other hand, reading a story aloud, driving a familiar route in a different way, or saying the alphabet backwards. Combine two senses together to build brain connections such as listening to music while sniffing a scented candle. Take a new class at the Cultural Center or our church.
- **Volunteer** — There is so much satisfaction when you give of yourself. You meet new people, learn new information, increase endorphins in your brain and know you are making a difference in this world.
- **Pray** — We know prayer benefits body, mind and spirit. Many studies have shown longer, happier and healthier lives when we follow our Maker's guidelines for our lives (THE BIBLE).
- **Avoid Alcohol** — This is toxic to your brain cells.
- **Nutrients** — There are many supplements that decrease inflammation: Curcumin, Omega 3 fatty acids, Vitamin E, green tea, B vitamins, melatonin, Vitamin C, CoQ10. All of these should be used under a doctor's supervision.

On **Saturday, April 30th**, at Laishley Park in Punta Gorda from 2pm-7pm, the Homeless Coalition is having a fundraising event called ISAIAH 58. There will be fellowship, music, prayer and fun. Each church will have a booth where they can either give away or sell items.

The Mission Team has decided to be a part of this event and will need your help. We will be looking for donations of craft items to sell, with the monies going to both the Homeless Coalition and to our Mission Fund. Items may be brought to the church any time after April 1st. We would also like to have a few people to come work at the booth.

The Homeless Coalition feeds 80 to 150 people each evening. Also, a food pantry is provided for families in need every Friday from 1- 4pm (each family can make use of this one time every month). Genesis House, which is a safe house, has 58 beds and from time to time cots and cribs are added for family members. Your donations of monies helps to support all of these projects.

We hope to see you at Laishley Park on April 30th supporting our work for the Homeless Coalition, and we pray you will stay for the worship service at 6pm as we close our day.

THE LIVING CROSS

At a Session meeting on January 10, 1978, Elder Arthur Kester proposed that a "Living Cross" consisting of a wooden cross, covered with flowers brought by the congregation, be constructed for Easter Sunday. He volunteered to make this cross and it is to be a part of the program this Easter.

The following poem was used on Easter Sunday by Mrs. Vada Beebe in the dedication of the flower covered cross; the poem was written by the builder of the cross, Arthur Kester.

THE LIVING CROSS

The Living Cross is mine to claim, God offers it in Jesus name
If I but consecrate my soul, The Ten Commandments as my goal.

And as this cross, today, we build, may every heart be amply filled
With love for Jesus, since He gave His life, for yours and mine to save.

May every flower that we place upon this rugged cross's face
Transfigure it to beauty rare as though each flower wore a prayer.

For beauty that God really sees comes not from living lives of ease,
Nor decorations, though they shine, it comes from souls like yours and mine.

The Living Cross is alive today for Jesus washed our sins away
Through crucifixion on this cross that God's great love be not a loss.

This life, we must perpetuate, discard all doubts, not hesitate
To live the lives He'd have us live, our thoughts must be more positive.

If we have God in all we do, then He will watch and see us through.
Our aims must then be high and sound, our feet will be on firmer ground.

May this cross be a symbol of our daily lives and Christian love,
And on this wondrous Easter Day we bow in reverence as we pray,




