Why Is Prayer Important? (Kelly O'Dell Stanley (Christianity.com))

Scriptures tell us several reasons to pray. Let's take a look at why it's important to pray and the benefits of prayer that you can begin to experience today. Prayer is important because it makes us more like Jesus and because it reveals to us the heart and mind of God.

When we look at the spiritual powerhouses of the past, we know that prayer was immensely important to them. C.S Lewis stated: "I pray because I can't help myself. ... I pray because the need flows out of me all the time, waking and sleeping. It doesn't change God. It changes me." And Martin Luther: "I have so much to do that I shall spend the first three hours in prayer." How do ordinary people live up to that, and why should we? Ordinary people can't be expected to drop everything to pray, right? Actually, ordinary people can't afford not to pray. Prayer is a gift given to us—and an activity expected of us—by the Lord. The Bible often says, "when you pray," not "if you pray," because prayer seems to be assumed of God's followers.

Let's take a look at what Scripture says about prayer:

- "And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's people." (Ephesians 6:18)
- "Pray continually." (1 Thessalonians 5:17)
- "Is anyone among you in trouble? Let them pray." (James 5:13)
- "Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer." (Romans 12:12)
- "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God." (Philippians 4:6)
- "Draw near to God and He will draw near to you." (James 4:8)

Praying because we're "supposed to" isn't always enough to motivate us, but the truth is that prayer is much more than a rule.

The Importance of Prayer

1. Prayer makes us more like Jesus.

If we look at the life of Jesus, we see that he prayed—with others (Luke 9:28), for others (Matthew 19:13-14), and on his own (Luke 5:16, Luke 6:12). It was a fundamental part of how he approached each day and every decision, retreating faithfully to spend time with his Father. Clearly prayer was important to Jesus—it was his lifeline and his connection to the Heavenly Father. It equipped him for the battles he was about to face. It kept alive the intimate relationship that sustained him. And it revealed to him God's desires and direction. If the goal of a Christian is to become more like Jesus, that process should include imitating his actions and living out his words. As we pray, we will become more like Jesus, and we will find that prayer changes us.

2. Prayer shows us the heart of God.

When Jesus prayed for his disciples in John 17, he prayed for those who would believe in him, "that all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me and I am in you" (John 17:21).

Prayer helps us become one with the Father and have the kind of relationship Jesus had with him. The Bible is filled with stories illustrating God's desire to have an intimate relationship with his people, and any close relationship involves communication. When two people have no contact with each other, their relationship will never advance. And since prayer is, quite simply, a conversation with God, it is how we get to know him.

When we come into his presence, all pretense is gone—there is no longer anything to hide because he sees all and knows all. Prayer humbles us because as we spend time with him, we realize how powerful and able and good God is and how much we need him. And yet, God accepts us as we are—not because he wants us to stay that way, but because he knows that the relationship comes first. As we grow to love him, we will want to become more like him. When we find forgiveness through prayer, God softens our heart and allows us to forgive others. When we experience God's compassion and mercy, we will share that with others. When we understand that God's grace is freely given, we recognize that no one is any more or less deserving of God's love than we are, and it transforms our hearts and our actions, helping us reveal God's generous love to others. 3. Prayer reveals the wisdom of God.

The best part about prayer is that it's a conversation that goes both directions. Yes, we will talk to God, but when we spend time with him and are willing to receive, we will also hear from him. <u>James 1:5</u> says, "If any of you lacks wisdom, you should ask God, who gives generously to all without finding fault, and it will be given to you."

Jesus prayed all night before selecting the 12 apostles (<u>Luke 6:12-16</u>), and he prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane to try to ascertain God's will regarding what God was asking him to do. His time in prayer helped align his will with that of the Father, just as our time with God will do for us. After getting in touch with the heart of God and realizing how much he loves us, we will learn to trust him and value his insight and guidance.

As we spend time talking to God, he aligns our will with his, changing the way we experience a situation and respond to a problem. Sometimes we miss his answers (because we're not listening or we're expecting a different answer so we don't recognize it when it comes), and other times the answer comes through reading the Bible or talking to others, but God will answer. His wisdom far exceeds our own because he sees farther and loves deeper and has his sights set on an eternity with those he loves, not just gratification in the immediate moment. There is no one else who can see and know what he does, and he delights to share his wisdom with us in prayer.





DISCIPLESHIP WISDOM

Two Disciplemaking Roads (Justin Gravitt.com/blog)

Eventually every category comes down to two. Even though there are thousands of options, the choice typically narrows to just two. Sound reductionist? It's not. Think about it. It's Coke and Pepsi, Crest and Colgate, Android and iPhone, Lowe's and Home Depot, Ford and Chevy, chocolate and vanilla, the list could go on and on. Over time categories come down to two. Of course other options still exist. Strawberry ice cream is an option, as is Subaru, but the vast majority of each category is represented by just two choices.

The same is true with disciplemaking. Can you guess what they are? It's not obvious, in part, because most people never choose how they will make a disciple, and in part, because the disciplemaking conversation just hasn't gotten here yet. But if you had to come up with the two main choices in how to make a disciple what would they be?

Engaging the question is both important and helpful, because if you can't even see another way to make a disciple then you're inevitably blind to the strengths and weaknesses of your approach. It's the equivalent of only being exposed to vanilla and then being asked to compare and contrast it to other flavors. So even if you never even try another disciplemaking approach, the awareness is valuable.

So what are the two main disciplemaking options?

1. Standardized Disciplemaking

The first and most popular way to make disciples is what I call the Standardized Discipling. It could also be called proficient discipling or wholesale disciple making. It's so popular that many disciple making experts don't believe effective disciple making happens any other way. Standardized discipling emphasizes simplicity, ease of use, and broad accessibility (scale). Product discipling means you need some thing to carry the weight of disciple making. That thing is always *in addition* to the Bible. Typically, it's a book or curriculum written by a pastor or faith hero. Standardized practitioners persuasively speak of the need for "tracks to run on" and a "basic skeleton that the disciple can flesh out." Additionally they emphasize the need for the disciple making process to be made so simple that anyone can do it.

Practically, standardized disciple making happens most often in groups of four or more (but can happen in both smaller and bigger spaces). Disciples are invited to move through the curriculum, book, Bible study, or app for a specific amount of time. Once they have completed the thing, they are asked/expected to lead a new group through the same.

There are clear advantages to standardized disciple making. It quickly engages participants with key discipleship concepts in a familiar setting. The setting is similar to small groups, so it feels comfortable to most of them. As a result, participants are able to absorb the information quickly and personally. The early results of standardized disciple making are broad enrollment and fast-formed disciples and disciple makers. There are certainly downsides too, but we'll save those for a future blog.

2. Tool-Based Disciple Making

The second, much lesser known way of discipling is Tool-based discipling. Tool-based discipling can also be called customized disciple making or creative disciple making. Customized discipling requires the disciple maker to be equipped and skilled in using different disciple making tools. The tools include things like illustrations, acronyms, or other "pass-on-ables" intended to both impact and equip the disciple. Tool-based disciplers emphasize the relational nature of disciple making, tailoring the approach to the individual, and helping the disciple become holistically like Jesus. Creative disciple makers speak persuasively about the need to equip and develop the disciple into a a mature version of themselves, not a copy of the disciple maker. The tools used along the way function as a place to hang Biblical truths, not as the primary focus or instrument of the training. In other words, the tool isn't the point, but rather a way to remember and to pass on the point.

Tool-based practitioners work tirelessly to equip disciples to disciple others out of their individual gifting and design, while maintaining the Bible as their primary resource. Practically, tool-based disciple making happens most often in one-to-one or one-to-two contexts and, when they are ready, they go out and do the same.

Tool-based disciple making has its advantages. Participants quickly feel equipped with a multitude of tools they can pass on to others. The relational experience of moving tools out from their meetings and into the lives of others sets them up to disciple others with both confidence and competence. The customized approach enables a tight focus right where the disciple needs it most. It connects their personal growth to their fruitfulness with others. This provides a unified field in which they can run on for the rest of their lives. There are certainly downsides too, but we'll save those for a future blog.

Naming these two disciple-making choices can help us consider the path that best fits the principles Jesus modeled in His disciple making ministry. Let's end with some poetry (hat tip to Robert Frost):

Two disciple making roads diverged in your 'hood And sorry you cannot travel both at once Stand and look down each as far as one can To where your sight grows dim.

I challenge you to stand at this disciple making fork in the road and look down each one as far as you can. Soon we'll do that together.
